IDEAS FOR WRITTEN INFORMATION TO PROVIDE TO TOUR VISITORS

As you tour your guests through your program, you will be including facts and data to emphasize the points you are making about your focus topic. Providing “take-away” documents to your guests enables them to actively participate in your tour and not have to focus on writing down the important points you are making.

Below is a list of ideas you might consider providing to your tour guests. Depending on how many items you choose to give them, you might consider placing them in a pocket folder.

Mementos from the tour:

- “Support Vermont’s Economy, Support Quality Childcare” Pin
- Have your students create a small gift for your tour guests to take with them as a token of thanks for their interest. (An art project or paper made by the children is often a nice gift.)

Written information about the topic you choose to focus your tour on:
